**Implication**: Agencies are prioritizing partners who can deliver integrated, audit-ready reporting across systems.

#### Privacy & Transparency Requirements

State privacy laws and public records requests are expanding, placing new pressure on how agencies manage video retention and data access.

**Implication**: Security programs must adopt stronger retention policies and access controls to meet legal and public expectations.
